September 09 - Community Dinner



Pastor's Thoughts for September



Hidden Treasure

Matthew 13:44-46 "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. 45 "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; 46 on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it.

These two parables are about hidden treasures. The

treasure in the field is hidden. The seeker can't see it and doesn't have any assurance that there is actually a treasure located there but persists until the treasure is found. The nature of the treasure in the field is never specified: we don't know what exactly it is. All that we know is that it is of so much value that the seeker will sell everything that he owns to purchase the field.

Like the seeker the merchant is always on the lookout for a beautiful pearl. She probably has looked at many hundreds of pearls in her quest for the most beautiful one. She has no assurance that today will be the day when her patience in seeking pays off. After finally finding one, and recognizing its value, the pearl merchant sells all that she has so that she might buy this one beautiful pearl.

The actions of the seeker and the merchant in selling all that they own are not logical or rational. But something drives them; first to search and then to purchase. Jesus taught these short parables to help us to understand the value of the kingdom of heaven; something that is so valuable that we will sell all that we own to acquire a place within.

This year, because of Covid-19, I am leading Vacation Bible School more independently than I have since coming to Vasa in 2016. Yes, it's a lot of work. Yes, I will be exhausted by the end of the week. But I am having a blast. For me, the kingdom of heaven is VBS with about 20 elementary children. They are treasures hidden in a field and pearls of great value.

- Duane Hanson talked about the septic system project at the parsonage. Duane had contacted Benson Septic from Hastings and Dan Voight for bids. Dan Voight did not get back with us so the project went forward with Benson Septic from Hastings. The pipes in the basement need to be changed so that the septic pipes don't run under the garage floor. The costs are as follows:

\$875 for design, permit and test holes
\$11,815 for new septic and drainfield
\$3320 for Red Wing Plumbing to change pipes in the basement and plumbing work
\$675 to pump grout into the old system to seal.
Total = \$16,685

Mark's Musings



A History of Hell

Many people assume that, being married to a pastor, some theological understanding will rub off. As a result, I sometimes get asked difficult questions such as, "What is heaven like?" Or, even more difficult, "What is hell like?" I recently read the book <u>"Heaven and Hell: A History of the Afterlife"</u>, by Bart Ehrman, that touches on this topic. Professor Ehrman teaches Religious Studies at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

Ehrman points out that the concepts of heaven and hell have evolved over time. The Torah, the first five books of the Old Testament, imply that death leads to oblivion, or at least a state of suspended animation. To the early Hebrews (1000 BCE), mind, body and soul were one. When the body gave out, so did the soul. Meanwhile, Greek philosophers (mainly Plato) developed the concept of a separate, everlasting soul. By the time of the books of the prophets (Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, 700-500 BCE), the Jews clearly also held this view of a separate everlasting soul. But there was no hell. For sinners, death led to annihilation.

In the second temple period (516 BCE – 70 AD) Judea was brutally ruled by the Persians, followed by the Greeks, and then the Romans. Jewish writers began to think "This isn't fair!" There must be a place of torment for cosmic justice to occur. Still, this view was not widely held. Paul's letters (~50 AD) don't talk of hell. He says in Romans 6:23, "For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." Paul follows the old Jewish idea that death leads to annihilation for sinners.

However, by the time the gospels are being written (70 – 110 AD), hell as a place of torment is expressed. Jesus uses the word "Gehenna", which was originally a valley near Jerusalem where the Israelites committed the unspeakable act of sacrificing their children to the Ammonite deity Molech (Jer. 7:31:35), and where later generations burned their garbage. In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus says, "And if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off. It is better for you to enter life crippled than to have two feet and be thrown into Gehenna" (9:45). But still, hell doesn't appear to be eternal. In Matthew's Gospel Jesus states, "Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather, be afraid of the One who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna" (10:28), implying again that death leads to destruction for sinners.

Over time, the idea took hold that there is a place of eternal torment, where the sins against the righteous are avenged. Dante's seven rings of hell, described in his "Divine Comedy" (1300 AD), codified this popular view of hell. Milton's "Paradise Lost" (1667 AD) further defined our view of hell.

Vasa is a Lutheran church. What is the Lutheran stance on hell? Officially, the church accepts the reality of hell. We aren't called to judge who is going to hell, nor should we allow the fear of hell to determine how we live. The creeds and Lutheran Confessions proclaim that Christ descended into hell and destroyed it for all believers. Wholly, and by God's grace alone, Christ has snatched us from the jaws of evil and the "gates of hell" will not prevail against our election.
