Thoughts from Pastor Maureen

Summer is the time when all the seeds that were planted this spring germinate and grow. When a farmer or gardener plants a seed they assume that it will grow as expected. A kernel of corn will produce a stalk of corn. A carrot seed will produce a carrot.

Jesus told a parable in Mark 4:30-32 about a tiny mustard seed that grows into "the greatest of all shrubs and puts forth large branches so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade." The mustard seed is not an acorn. It will not grow into a mighty oak tree. It will grow to be a shrub. That's what this seed was created to become. If the farmer wanted an oak tree they better plant an acorn.

Let's imagine that the mustard shrub starts to compare itself to an oak tree. It might begin to feel inadequate because it's not big and tall. It doesn't produce acorns. But doing so is inappropriate since the shrub is fulfilling what God created it to be. From God's perspective it has an important place in the larger ecosystem since it provides shade and shelter for those particular birds that prefer smaller plants that are closer to the ground. It's the same way for people. If we agree that God created us we must strive to avoid comparing ourselves to others. We have a place in the kingdom and tasks to accomplish.

The same idea applies to churches. If we agree that God planted us in a specific place then we must strive to avoid comparing our church to other churches. Whether we are an oak tree or a mustard shrub doesn't matter. Our congregation has a place in the kingdom and tasks to accomplish.

Enjoy the summer and don't work too hard mowing the lawn as we all strive to keep up with the rapid growth of the grass.

Kathy reviewed the Treasurer's Report, Income & Expense Report and the Designated Fund Report. The checkbook balance is \$69,926. The financial position of the church remains strong. Monthly expenses average about \$18,000. Best practice is to maintain a three month cash balance, or about \$54,000.

Payroll taxes will run over budget this year because snow plowing and lawn mowing expenses are now being treated as employee expenses, not independent contractor. These tax implications were not included in the budget.

Executive Board Report (NA) **Church Council** Pastor's Report) Attached) Along with Ben and B-J Norman I attended the SE MN Synod Assembly on Highlights! Saturday May 11th. For the first time in many years Vasa contributed money to the offering collected at the assembly. Their goal was to reach \$20,000 and as of Saturday afternoon, (May 11) they were at \$19,500. The money was designated to go toward a program of Gustavus Adolphus called Continuous Growth Pathway, to the Region 3 Archives, and Luther Seminary. Pastor currently has a list of 20 names on the shut-in list. Of those 20 names about half (10) do not have access to the Vasa worship online. Pastor allows an hour for each visit, although several are so glad to have company that the visit is often longer. Pastor always offer communion. Museum Board (Attached) Soup Luncheon was a big success. It brought in around \$2,064.00. \$20,000.00 were put into a C.D at First Farmers and Merchants Bank.

MARK'S MEDITATION

All four Gospels describe John the Baptist as a forerunner of Jesus. In addition, Jewish/Roman historian Flavius Josephus (37-100 CE) writes about both John and Jesus in *Antiquities of the Jews*. Therefore, we can be quite certain that John was a historical figure. But what was John's ministry? How did that compare to Jesus' teaching? Here are some details.

Both John and Jesus were Galileans. Galilee is not Judea. It is north of Jerusalem and was separately administered by Herod Antipas, one of the sons of Herod the Great. Both of these "kings" were installed by the Romans who controlled all of Syria, of which the Romans considered Galilee and Judea to be a part.

Both John and Jesus offered a ministry of "repentance and forgiveness" that included ritual immersion (baptism) in the Jordan River. Although the Gospels never describe Jesus personally baptizing anyone, it is implied that he did, because the gospels say that his disciples baptized. This practice was *radical*! It was a direct assault on the "business" that was sacrifice and worship at the Temple in Jerusalem. The temple priests, and much of the text of the Old Testament, insisted that God grants forgiveness only through animal sacrifice in the Temple. This is undoubtedly why John was executed by Herod Antipas. It also sheds light on Jesus' act of overturing the tables in the

Temple. (The Synoptic gospels pin the blame for John's execution on Herodias, Herod's wife. It may be that she was more concerned with Temple practice than Herod.)

What was the relationship between John and Jesus? It's hard to say. Jesus' ministry appears to pick up right after John's execution. Some scholars think this suggests Jesus was originally a disciple of John. But they could have been rivals. We know from Paul's epistles that there were still groups dedicated to John, not Jesus, decades later.

I think it makes sense that Jesus was originally a disciple of John. That makes his ministry a continuation of what John started. However, over time John was depreciated. Mark, our earliest gospel, paints a relatively flattering picture of John the Baptist. Thirty years later, the gospel of John has John the Baptist declare "After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me." (John 1:30)

It appears that both John the Baptist and Jesus believed that God is willing to meet us where we are, and forgive our sins apart from a Temple or church hierarchy. Pastor Maureen says as much every time we have communion when she says "Everyone is welcome at the Lord's Supper."
